This is not the first time that Methodist Encampment has had a newsletter. More than a quarter century ago there was another one, and the neighborhood was even organized into an association called the *Mt. Wesley Neighborhood Association*, with an elected **Board of Directors!!!** Look on the last page for a sample of one the issues of the *Mt. Wesley Neighborhood News* from 1997.



Over two years ago some of us started working with the local Kerr County Historical Society to apply to the State for a subject marker for our unique neighborhood. The application was

accepted, and then the text for the marker was also accepted in July of 2019. There has been a long delay for the physical production of the marker, but we have been told that it is now ready to ship. Thanks to the generosity of the Rio Texas Conference, who owns the property, the marker will be placed at the northeast corner of McAllen and Methodist Encampment Road. A dedication will be planned, and we will let you know about that later. The research for this project is available on a flash drive in the Little Library, please return it once you

have downloaded it. We continue to collect historical data, if you have some to share, please let us know.



Our **Little House of Peace Free Library** was two years old on July 29th, and it is starting to require a bit of attention. We now have so many books that the house needed another shelf in order to organize them better. **Thanks to Mark Stone for building a strong new shelf in the back of the Library.** 

Now we need to find a volunteer with the skills and time to freshen up the green bench on the Library campus, site of a great love story (see below)! This bench is a historic Methodist Encampment landmark in itself. It is a pew from the outdoor chapel at the Bolivian cross on the summit of Mt. Wesley. It used to be about three times as wide as it is now and had three pockets for hymnals on the back. However, it fell into the hands of someone who thought it was too big and needed to be cut down to size. The House of Peace behind the Library has one of its sister pews in full size. It doesn't have to be green. It could be stripped, stained and sealed to look more natural as it used to be. If this is something you can take on, please step forward and make yourself known! I have the paint! It would be a great service for Methodist Encamp-ment and those who visit us.

Our little landmark is impacting people's lives:
