For those who may not have heard, Methodist Encampment has been selected by the Texas Historical Commission for a neighborhood marker! CONGRATULATIONS to the Stones and all who contributed to the effort. Right now the draft texts of what the marker will actually say are going back and forth to be finalized. The issue of where precisely the marker will be erected has not yet been resolved; a site on the uphill side of the corner of Methodist Encampment Road and McAllen is under discussion with the administrator of that property, which is currently the First Methodist Church.

A literary event of major significance is coming to Kerrville and in fact right to the door of the Little House of Peace Free Library: It's the greatest detective story in literary history! Your very own Library Steward and Kathleen Hudson, English professor at Schreiner University, have teamed up to present a special lecture by Houston author Bonner Miller Cutting, which explores the Shakespeare authorship question. The talk will take place at Schreiner on **June 6<sup>th</sup>**, the evening before the performance of Shakespeare's "The Merry Wives of Windsor" at Shakespeare-in-the-Park. If you walk by the Little Free Library, you will notice a poster for the lecture on the door, and inside there are announcement cards to take and share with others who might be interested. Bonner Cutting will be staying in the neighborhood, and *at 4 p.m. on Friday, June 6<sup>th</sup> she has graciously agreed to sit on the green bench by the library for a little while to talk to any neighbors who would like to say hello.*
